Requested 'info' and instructions will be printed in "QUILL" from time to time so that members may take part in this interesting work. NO POLUTION AT DYRHAM PARK!

Due to the doubtful condition of the water at Dyrham Park, we recently obtained the services of the analyst of the Lea Conservancy Board. Samples having been taken at all of the inlets and as well at various points around the lake, we were furnished with the following encouraging report:

(A) There were no signs of polution in the samples.

(B) The lake water was capable of supporting fish life.

(C) The bed of the lake contained a good deal of vegetable organic matter which would be liable to give rise to "overturning" during warm weather, and thus cause fish to die.

Further enquiries regarding the vegetable matter are being made.
